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AFRICAN AND AFRICAN AMERICAN STUDIES

African and African American studies is an interdisciplinary program that focuses on people of African descent throughout the world and the diversity of past and present experiences of those who live in Africa, Central America, South America, the Caribbean, and the United States. The program is structured to combine knowledge of the African diaspora with intellectual and practical training in specific areas to create more effective communities and global partnerships, and prepare students of all ethnicities to better understand, value and more effectively participate in our increasingly diverse society.

CONCENTRATION ELECTIVES – Africa Diaspora Courses

Students are required to take 15 total credits of African Diaspora Courses:

RELATED AREAS

(Catalog Year 2015 – Current)

Students are required to take 15 credits of Related Area courses. These courses can be chosen from AFR prefix courses. Courses from a non-AAAS prefix may also be accepted if approved and if the courses contain at least 50% African, Caribbean, Afro-Latin American, or African American content; consult your advisor in the School of Social Transformation for such courses, or if you have questions about Related Area courses.

Foreign Language Requirement

Students pursuing Bachelor of Arts in Justice Studies must demonstrate intermediate proficiency in a second language by completing the courses specified below with a grade of “C” (2.00) or higher in each course. Second-language course requirements may be fulfilled in one of the following ways:

- Completion of second language course work at the intermediate level (202 or equivalent). Those students completing this requirement in Ancient Greek must take both GRK 301 and 302; students completing the requirement in Portuguese or Romanian must complete POR 314 or ROM 314.
- A foreign language course at the 300 level or higher taught in the foreign language and having 202 or its equivalent as a prerequisite.
- Completion of secondary education at a school in which the language of instruction is not English.
- Completion of SHS 202 American Sign Language IV or its equivalent.
